Course Descriptions

HIST 2A World History to 1600 – 3 Units

Advisories: Ability to read at 12th grade level.

This course surveys world societies from prehistoric times to 1600. Emphasis is on the interaction and comparison of peoples and cultures, and tracing concurrent political, social, cultural, economic, and religious developments. The course examines the key elements of various cultures and their legacy for the global community today. (HBCU, UC, CSU, C-ID HIST 150)

ENGL C1000 Academic Reading and Writing - 3 Units

Prerequisite: Cumulative high school GPA of ≥ 2.6 . Submit ENGL clearance form to enroll.

In this course, students receive instruction in academic reading and writing, including writing processes, effective use of language, analytical thinking, and the foundations of academic research. (Cal-GETC Area 1A)

AJ 21 Criminal Justice in Society - 3 Units

Advisories: Ability to read at 12th grade level.

This course introduces the characteristics of the U.S. criminal justice system, particularly the structure and function of US police, courts, and corrections. Focus is placed on crime measurement, explanations of/responses to crime, components of the system, and current challenges. Students are introduced to the origins and development of criminal law, legal process, and sentencing and incarceration policies. (HBCU, UC, CSU, C-ID AJ 110)

ART 3 Art Appreciation – 3 Units

This course provides the non-art major a general introduction to art that offers a look at works of art through the study of theory, terminology, themes, design principles, media, techniques, with an introduction to the visual arts across time and diverse cultures. This is not a studio art class. (HBCU, UC, CSU, C-ID ARTH 100)

BUS 20 Introduction to Business - 3 Units

This course provides a multi-disciplinary understanding of how culture, society, economic systems, legal, international, political, financial institutions, and human behavior interact to affect a business organization's policy and practices within the U.S. and the global society. The course includes business organizational structure and design; leadership, human resource management, organized labor practices; marketing; organizational communication; technology; entrepreneurship; legal, accounting, financial practices; and the stock and securities market. (UC, CSU, C-ID BUS 110)

COMM C1000 Introduction to Public Speaking - 3 Units

In this course, students learn and apply foundational rhetorical theories and techniques of public speaking in a multicultural democratic society. Students discover, develop, and critically analyze ideas in public discourse through research, reasoning, organization, composition, delivery to a live audience (via synchronous virtual performance or recorded in-person performance) and evaluation of various types of speeches, including informative and persuasive speeches. (Cal-GETC Area 1C).

ECE 21 Child and Adolescent Development - 3 Units

This course examines the major physical, psychosocial, and cognitive/language developmental milestones for children, both typical and atypical, from conception through adolescence, with emphasis on interactions between maturational processes and environmental factors. Students will observe children, evaluate individual differences and analyze characteristics of development at various stages. (HBCU, UC, CSU)

FCS 6 Nutrition - 3 Units

This course presents scientific concepts of nutrition related to the function of nutrients in basic life processes and current health issues. Emphasis is given to the role of food choices and physical activity on health, body weight, and risk of disease. Students undertake a self-study of personal dietary intake and habits compared to the Dietary Guidelines for Americans. (HBCU, UC, CSU)

H ED 1 Health Education - 3 Units

This course is designed to enhance the student's knowledge of a variety of health-related concepts and increase motivation and desire to take personal responsibility to achieve high level wellness. (UC, CSU)

HIST 17B History of the United States - 3 Units

Advisories: Ability to read at the 12th grade level.

This course surveys US history from Reconstruction to the present. Emphasis is on the political, economic, intellectual, and social forces which molded modern America. Topics include geographical regions encompassed by the US; racial, class, religious, and gender conflicts; immigration, politics, economics, culture, national identity. A study of California state and local government is included. (HBCU, UC, CSU, C-ID HIST 140)

MUSIC 4 Exploring Music - 3 Units

This course is an exploration of growth and development of music from the 11th Century to the present. This course includes forms and styles used in Western art and surveys those factors influencing popular, rock, and commercial music as well as music used for live theater and in films. Not a music major course. (HBCU, UC, CSU, C-ID MUS 100)

PETHEORY 41 Sport in Society – 3 Units

This course is an overview of the historical development of sport and current roles of sport in society. It includes interaction of sport with societal values and ethics as well as the outcomes affecting professional and amateur sports. (HBCU, UC, CSU)
