Ethnic Studies Model Curriculum

The Ethnic Studies Model Curriculum Advisory Committee met for the final time on April 25–26, 2019, to provide final feedback on the working draft of the model curriculum. The Instructional Quality Commission (IQC) will be provided a draft of the model curriculum, and if the IQC approves the draft at its May 16, 2019, meeting, it will be posted for public review.
