## Dashboard Basics





### California School Dashboard

The California School Dashboard (www.caschooldashboard.org) is a new website that gives communities across the state access to California's groundbreaking new accountability and continuous improvement system.





### California School Dashboard

- The Dashboard replaces the old Academic Performance Index.
- The Dashboard provides parents, educators and the public a far more complete picture of what is going on in our schools.
- The easy-to-read reports on the Dashboard show school and district performance on multiple indicators.

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### California School Dashboard

With the Dashboard, California is shifting from "How did we do?" to "How do we get better?"



## Local Educational Agencies (LEAs)

### The California Way

The Dashboard is a critical component of the major shifts taking place in California's K-12 system, including:

- Upgrading academic standards
- Providing students with groundbreaking online assessments in math, English and this spring, in science
- Providing more resources to schools, especially to students with the greatest needs, while also giving local leaders more control over spending decisions

## Background

Passed in 2013, the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) significantly changed how California:

- provides resources to public schools, and
- holds LEAs accountable for improving student performance.

From "sanction and punish" to continuous improvement by:

Building on LEA strengths within priority areas

Developing capacity of LEAs to address disparities in student groups

Supporting LEAs to identify and improve areas of low performance





## Background

- The State Board of Education (SBE) adopted a new accountability tool required by LCFF, called the evaluation rubrics, that includes a set of state and local measures.
- The tool is the result of more than a year of stakeholder engagement and SBE actions.
- The Dashboard is how performance data from the evaluation rubrics are shown to LEAs and the public.
- Stakeholders can use the Dashboard to see how LEAs and schools are meeting the needs of their students.

### **Key Features**

- Easy to use reports
- The reports show LEA or school performance on:
  - 6 state performance indicators, and
  - 4 local indicators
    - ▶ 6 for county offices of education (COEs)
- ▶ LEA/school search: Users can view reports that present the performance data in different ways.

The Equity Report provides the performance levels for the state indicators and identifies the total number of student groups represented in each indicator, in addition to the number of student groups in red/orange.

A dash (--) indicates that the student group consists of less than 11 students, the minimum size for any reporting; an asterisk (\*) indicates the student group consists of less than 30 students, and the performance level (color) is not presented or included for accountability purposes. An N/ A indicates that data is not currently available. Additional details can be found in the California School Dashboard Technical Manual (link will be provided).

#### Narrative

The narrative text box is provided as an optional feature for local educational agencies to describe their performance on the state indicators and local indicators. This option allows LEAs to provide additional information and context as part of the display.

## Dashboard: Demographic Info

The top of every page of the Dashboard identifies the LEA or school and which report the user has selected, along with key demographic information.

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### Dashboard: State Performance Levels

The Dashboard shows the performance levels using the color-coded images below.

Yellow






Red (Lowest)



### **Dashboard: State Performance Levels**



The color and amount of fill (e.g., Green always has four segments filled, Red always has only one segment filled) are two ways of showing the performance level. This ensures accessibility for all individuals and that the reports are useable when printed in black-and-white or photocopied.

## **Dashboard: Narrative Summary**

LEAs also have the option of adding additional information in a narrative box that will show up at the bottom of each report.

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## Communicating the Dashboard





#### **More Than a Number**

- One test taken on one particular day doesn't provide a complete picture of all the ways schools are helping students succeed.
- Evaluating schools and districts on multiple measures of student success -- including test scores, high school graduation rates, college and career readiness indicators, English learner progress and suspension rates – gives a fuller picture.
- You can't drive a car by only watching the speedometer. You must also keep your eye on the road, check the mirrors, monitor the gas tank and pay attention if the engine light comes on.
- In the same way, the Dashboard's multiple indicators give a fuller picture of a school's progress.



### Focus on Equity – Success for Every Student

- Under the previous system, data about student group performance was limited to test scores only.
- The new system provides information on graduation rates, test scores, suspension data and English learner progress disaggregated by student group.
- Highlighting disparities among student groups will help parents, educators and community members pinpoint specific areas in need of targeted assistance.
- The California School Dashboard will help ensure that schools keep their promise to the community to improve learning for all students.



### **Supporting Local Decision-Making**

- Through the Dashboard, districts and schools have access to the information they need to make the best local decisions about the education of children.
- The Dashboard will help schools and districts align resources to student outcomes through Local Control and Accountability Plans.
- Schools that do not improve over time will be identified as eligible for assistance.
- Those that are excelling can assist others by sharing their methods and practices.





### **A First Step**

- The California School Dashboard launching in March is intended as an early model ("beta") of the accountability system that will be fully implemented after feedback and adjustments.
- Metrics will be added over time as data is collected.
- As with any practice year of a new system, there may be hiccups as unanticipated issues arise.

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Feedback will lead to design changes or userinterface changes.

### Celebrating Successes, Focusing on Challenges

- By using the California School Dashboard to develop Local Control and Accountability Plans, schools and districts will be focusing on the alignment of resources to student groups that may need extra support.
- The goal of the state is to assist and support schools and districts so they can to address their challenges.
- Local challenges are best addressed at the local level, but and it will take time and understanding to build capacity to thrive.

California's new accountability and continuous improvement system provides information about how local educational agencies and schools are meeting the needs of California's diverse student population based on a concise set of measures.


