We want to welcome everyone back to the 2020 -2021 school year! We understand that these are difficult times for some of you and lots of changes are being made to our everyday lives. We are making adjustments to our program and

all of our services will be done remotely. We plan to have a drive thru pick up day for materials that will be used in our zoom classes each month. We hope that you all will be able to participate.

The first goal that we will focus on is Cultural Identity and Awareness. This is for our Pre k thru 12th grade students. We surveyed all of our enrolled students and chose the 4 regions where most of our students are from. We have designed monthly zoom culture classes that will include a segment on California, Southwest, Northeast, and the Great Plains Indians. These sessions will be interactive and allow us to come together as a Native Community and learn from one another. We will explore food, culture, music, art, and much more. We will start each session with a student and/or Elder story telling session. If you are interested, we'd love to hear from you. If you have any traditions that you'd like to share we'd love to have you share.

The second goal for our program is increasing College and Career readiness. We have designed zoom sessions that will target our 7th – 12th students to prepare them for their future. We will offer help with FAFSA, College Prep – Scholarships, College Workshops, Resources, Native Colleges, and much more. Our zoom sessions will include College recruiting and Alumni from our program. It's important that we provide students with the tools and resources they need to reach their goals after high school.



SABRINA'S KITCHEN

CALIFORNIA TURKEY AND BACON LETTUCE WRAPS WITH BASIL MAYO

Ingredients

MAKES 2 WRAPS

1 head iceberg lettuce

4 slices gluten-free deli turkey (I like Applegate Farms)

4 slices gluten-free bacon, cooked (I like Applegate Farms)

1 avocado, thinly sliced

1 roma tomato, thinly sliced

For the Basil-Mayo:

1/2 cup gluten-free mayonnaise (I like Hellmann's Olive Oil Mayo)

6 large basil leaves, torn

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1 garlic clove, chopped

salt

pepper

Directions

For the Basil-Mayo: combine ingredients in a small food processor then process until smooth. Alternatively, mince basil and garlic then whisk all ingredients together. Can be done a couple days a head of time.

Lay out two large lettuce leaves then layer on 1 slice of turkey and slather with Basil-Mayo. Layer on a second slice of turkey followed by the bacon, and a few slices of both avocado and tomato. Season lightly with salt and pepper then fold the bottom up, the sides in, and roll like a burrito. Slice in half then serve cold.

TEACHER'S CORNER

"Proceed with Caution: Using Native American Folktales in the Classroom" by: Debbie Reese

Desirable Markers of Authenticity

- 1. Works of fiction are tribally specific. This means that the tribal affiliation of major characters is specified, and content related to history, setting, and material artifacts accurately reflects that tribe. It means characters are Choctaw or Meskwaki or Apache instead of "Indian" or "Native American" or "American Indian."
- 2. Retold folktales, myths, and legends specify the source for the story and details regarding changes the author made in retelling the story. The retold story reflects the tribe from which it originated.
- 3. Illustrations of setting, characters, and tribal artifacts accurately reflect the tribe specified.
- 4. Family stories include grandparents, aunts, and uncles. In American Indian families, they figure prominently in the lives of children.
- 5. Significant Native characters have personal names and are portrayed with a range of emotion and human qualities.

Undesirable Elements That Signify Stereotypes and Bias •

- 1. Alphabet books with "E" is for "Eskimo" or "I" is for "Indian."
- 2. Counting books in which "Indians" are presented as items to count.
- 3. Non-Native characters who play "Indian" by engaging in stereotypical activities of a savage or overly romanticized nature.\
- 4. Native characters portrayed as savage, with no context provided for aggressive behaviors.
- 5. Native characters portrayed as unrealistically heroic, with no flaws.
- 6. Adjectives and verbs used to describe Native characters as animal-like.
- 7. A plot and/or theme that suggests Native Americans accepted defeat passively.
- 8. A plot and/or theme that suggests Native Americans fought settlers and soldiers for no reason.
- 9. Arbitrary references to chief, warrior, brave, squaw, or papoose to refer to characters. These commonly used words subtly dehumanize American Indians and distance the reader from the human qualities they share with Native American people.
