



MAPLE SYRUP AND BERRY TURTLE CORNBREAD or in Oneida wáht? óhses okhále[?] káhik a?no·wál kanʌstóhale

Ingredients:

4 cups berries (frozen or thawed)1 cup maple syrup5 cups of kan^stohale (cornbread) flour



Directions:

Fill a kettle about three-quarters full of water and place on high heat. Put the berries and maple syrup in a large glass bowl and heat thoroughly.

Pour the hot berries and syrup into the kanAstohale (cornbread) flour and mix thoroughly. Put a half-cup of boiling water into the mix and stir. If your dough is still powdery, add more water. If your dough gets too runny, add more flour. The texture of the dough should be like Play-Doh.


Turn down kettle heat to a slow rolling boil.

Place the dough into a cake mold, tap the turtle to release cake and lower into the water. Boil on a rolling boil for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Remove the kanAstohale turtles from the boiling water and serve.

Our thoughts and prayers are with his family.




Teacher's Corner: (Did you know? This Month is NATIVE American Heritage Month!) Teaching Tips for Honoring Native Americans By Gina Lopez

November is Native American Indian Heritage month! It is so important to honor and recognize our Native students and their history. There are more than 600 tribes, languages and customs amongst the Native Peoples. Here are a few steps you can take to be fully prepared to teach your students about Native Americans. The first is to acknowledge that we are on indigenous land. Here in Stockton, we are on the indigenous land of the Miwok and Yokut Indians. You can conduct research on the Miwok and Yokuts to learn more about their history, how they lived, what they endured and their specific customs. Also utilize resources that represent the Native American perspective. Teach about the longstanding history of Native Americans, the boarding schools, missions and various Indian laws the government passed that have had a negative impact on Native Americans. Teach students about historical events such as the Trail of Tears, the Indian Removal Act and many others you will find through the resource below. If you are going to require students to create missions, make sure to access resources that include the Native American perspective.
