The State Board of Education, by resolution, has designated November 2017 as American Indian/Native American Heritage Month. The California State Board of Education recognized in its Multicultural Education Policy that each student needs an opportunity to understand the common humanity underlying all people.

ANALYSIS

The Stockton Unified School District supports this proclamation urging educational leaders throughout the city to involve themselves and their schools in a citywide focus on improvement in education about our American Indian/Native American Heritage and to create ways in which communities can participate in helping Stockton's schools meet the National Goals set forth by the White House Conference on Indian Education. Further, the District encourages all educational communities to commemorate this occasion with appropriate instructional activities.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Governing Board adopt Resolution No. 17-21 proclaiming November 2017 as American Indian/Native American Heritage Month.

STOCKTON UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT Resolution No. 17-21

A Proclamation Declaring November 2017 as American Indian/Native American Heritage Month

WHEREAS, this country was home to generations of native peoples long before the arrival of European explorers and each of these tribes had a unique and vibrant culture as well as a system of social order; and

WHEREAS, the European settlers were aided in their survival by the teachings of this country's first inhabitants, and the contributions of the American Indians/Native Americans to this nation's government, history, and culture are as numerous and varied as the tribes themselves; and

WHEREAS, every tribe has celebrated heroes of its own in sports, the arts, film, literature, engineering, medicine, education, and environmental science; and

WHEREAS, the American culture has been greatly influenced by traditions of native peoples and their close relationship to the earth and all its inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, the California State Board of Education recognized in its Multicultural Education Policy that each student needs an opportunity to understand the common humanity underlying all people; and

WHEREAS, the History-Social Science Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve states that the history curriculum of the community, state, region, nation, and world must reflect the experiences of men and women and of different racial, religious, and ethnic groups which is integrated at every level; and

WHEREAS, educational leaders throughout the city are urged to involve themselves and their schools in a citywide focus on improvement in education about our American Indian/Native American Heritage and to create ways in which communities can participate in helping Stockton's schools meet the National Goals set forth by the White House Conference on Indian Education.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Stockton Unified School District Board of Education hereby proclaims the month of November 2017 as American Indian/Native American Heritage Month and encourages all educational communities to commemorate this occasion with appropriate instructional activities; and

FURTHERMORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Governing Board directs that suitably prepared copies of this resolution be distributed to all schools in the Stockton Unified School District.

NAIC Parent Advisory Board Volunteer Process

Beginning July 1, 2017:

***Parents should always be afforded an opportunity to volunteer pursuant to Education Code §51100. However, a site/program can limit volunteer opportunities (e.g., not everyone can volunteer as a football coach; not everyone can volunteer on a field trip; etc.). Additionally, a parent wanting to visit their student's classroom does not need to be processed as a volunteer and can make arrangements at the school. The volunteer program is designed for recurring involvement in the District, school, or program.



Process:

If you are interested in becoming a volunteer:

- 1) Visit the BAM website: http://beamentor.org/stockton. Here you will need to enter your personal information and select the school site(s) and/or program(s) you would like to volunteer with.
- 2) Your information will then be forwarded to the selected school(s)/program(s) (e.g., PYA, Stagg, Preschool).
- 3) The BAM coordinator from the site/program will review and approve your application to volunteer.
- Once you are approved by the site/program, you will be referred to the Stockton Unified School District Police Department for a background check, ID badge, and possible fingerprinting (depending on the volunteer position).
- Once you receive clearance from the SUSD Police Department, provide a copy of your document to the NAIC Director

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT VOLUNTEERING:

Where do I go to get fingerprinted if I want to volunteer?

All applicants are fingerprinted at the SUSD Police Department, 640 N. San Joaquin Street, Stockton, CA 95202. Find all Volunteer Information at www.beamentor.org/stockton.

When can I come in?

You will have to go online and apply to be a parent volunteer. Go to the website www.beamentor.org/stockton. You will be directed on how to apply once you enter your email address.

What will it cost me to get fingerprinted?

There is no charge for volunteers to be fingerprinted.

How do you fingerprint applicants?

All applicants are fingerprinted electronically via a live scan machine and results are sent to the Department of Justice.

What do I bring with me?

Be prepared to show a current State or Federal issued identification card. We do not accept check cashing cards or expired ID cards for identification. All photo identification must be current.

Do I need to be fingerprinted again if I was fingerprinted before?

Yes, the Department of Justice requires volunteers to be fingerprinted every 12 months. If you are applying for a job with Stockton Unified, you will also need to be re-fingerprinted. The Department of Justice runs two different kinds of background checks on employees and volunteers. There is a \$51.00 charge for employment fingerprinting.



RECIPE



Blackberry Wojapi

From the American Indian Health and Diet Project Ingredients: 1 pint blackberries, rinsed

1/2 cup water

1 tbsp. honey (or to taste)

2 tbsp. sugar (or to taste)

Preparation:

1. Place rinsed blackberries in a medium-sized saucepan. Using a potato masher or heavy spoon, mash berries, leaving identifiable chunks.

2. Add water to pan and bring mixture to boil, then turn heat down to low and simmer for an hour, stirring every 15 minutes or so.

3. Once mixture has simmered, add honey and sugar as needed for desired sweetness. I find blackberries are more on the tart side, so I added some sugar in addition to the honey.

4. Serve hot or at room temperature. Can be served with oatmeal, pancakes, waffles, yogurt, ice cream, biscuits, and of course, fry bread!
