## Goal:

To develop bilingual and biliterate students.

## Model:

90:10 Immersion Program in Spanish, where the majority of the school curriculum is taught in Spanish during the primary years.

K-1st Grade students receive 90% of their daily instruction in Spanish and 10% in English.

Each year, students will receive more instruction in English as the percentage of Spanish instruction time begins to decrease.

By 5th Grade, students will receive 50% of their daily instruction in Spanish and 50% in English.

Students in 7th and 8th Grade will enroll in a one- 50 minute Spanish class, the rest of the subjects will be taught in English.

\*Due to the nature of this program, students must possess basic Spanish language skills in grades 2nd through 6th.

\*7th & 8th Grade students will be enrolled in one period of Spanish.





## Benefits of Dual Language Immersion Programs

- Learning additional languages at a young age, contributes to closing achievement gaps amongst special needs students, English learners, and minority populations (Thomas & Collier, 2012).
- Students who have participated in language programs have shown academic gains in various subject areas such as ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies (Taylor & Lafayette, 2010).
- Being bilingual can lead to improved listening skills, since the brain has to work harder to distinguish different types of sounds in two or more languages (Krizman et al., 2012).
- Students who study a foreign language for 4 years or more, score higher on standardized tests (The College Board SAT, 2003).
- Students who enroll in "rigorous" language programs were more likely to earn better grades and less likely to drop out.
